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
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

A charming production in which each letter of the alphabet is, often ingeniously rendered into a pastoral landscape setting. In the same year, the publisher Engelmann also issued the plates as individual flash-cards within a slipcase under the title Landscape alphabet, or, Introduction to belles lettres.







The uncommon first edition of an exhaustive and authoritative, manual on British Army drills; published in the penultimate year of the Napoleonic Wars. A second edition appeared in 1816. In his prefatory remarks, the anonymous infantry officer bemoans the 'little attention which is sometimes bestowed to the instruction of the troops' and the 'careless manner in which the drill and exercise are often carried on', situations which he hopes his book may rectify.



The sole edition, printed at Calcutta for private circulation, of a series of articles and letters reprinted from various Indian periodicals by anonymous officer of the 7th Madras Light Cavalry, recording contemporary affairs in southern India, including the travels of Scottish explorer Sir Alexander Burnes (1805-1841), and an account of Jean-François Allard (1785-1839), a former General of Napoleon, then in the employ of the Maharaja Ranjit Singh.



The second and final edition, printed in the same year as the first, of a succinct series of observations on the infantry and cavalry drills of the British Army by veteran of the, then still ongoing, French Revolutionary Wars, Philip Astley (1742-1814), more common remembered as an equestrian performer and circus proprietor. Astley provides observations on, *inter alia*, 'small bodies advancing into an enemy's country', 'the use and formation of dragoon swords', and 'diseases incidental to horses during a campaing'.



A rare atlas produced by James Morison of Perth (1762-1809), evidently reusing several maps originally produced for his other publications, with references within the engraved cartouches to his 'New Modern Gazetteer, 1807' (and variously 1808) and his 'New Dictionary of the Bible'; others, such as 'A Correct Map of South America with the latest Discoveries 1799', make no such reference

Many of the engraved maps, which are admittedly of varying quality of execution, are unsigned, or feature just Morison's own imprint; but amongst those which are signed feature the names of well-known Scottish engravers such as **Daniel Lizars** (1754-1812), Thomas Clerk (fl. 1810-30) and James Rymer.

OCLC locates just four copies worldwide, at BL, Newberry, Victoria and Montreal; COPAC adds no further.

The speech to which Bator alludes in his presentation inscription is that delivered by former Prime Minister **Sir Anthony Eden (1897-1977)** at the Geneva Conference, of which he was one of the joint chairmen, that concluded with the with the settlement of the Indo-China War.

Two publishers annotated 'Reference Copy' catalogues, complete with specimen plates and the 1870 engraved portrait of Jane Austen, bound together for use by the publisher's family. Bentley's Standard Novel series of monthly single-volume reprints, priced at six shillings each, began in February 1831. The series included the first inexpensive reprints of Jane Austen's work, indeed the Bentley editions were the most frequently republished examples of the Austen canon during the nineteenth-century.

The second mentioned catalogue is dated to January 1882 and the limitation stated on the title as 1/100 copies; with annotations at the end in the hand of Richard Bentley (1854-1936), grandson and the last proprietor of the family publishing firm that bore his name.





The third, and seemingly final edition of a manual on the art of handwriting, first published in 1820. The book provides instruction on, *inter alia*, fashioning a 'good pen', the proper pen 'for each hand' (round hand, French, German, Dutch etc.), and a brief note on 'how to preserve ink from mould'.

This copy was presented by furniture designer Ambrose Heal (1872-1959) to calligrapher, palaeographer and author on handwriting Alfred Fairbank (1895-1982).

The first edition is scarce. The second apparently unrecorded. The usual databases record copies of the third at just two locations (Newberry and NYPL).







The former owner of this copy was perhaps **Robert Melvill (1723-1809)**, British Army officer, veteran of the Jacobite rising of 1745 and the Seven Years' War, sometime governor of, and plantation owner at, Grenada, prominent antiquary, and inventor of artillery.





The Calcutta Gazette, or Oriental Advertiser, was founded in March 1784 as a weekly by British East India Trading Company officer and Persian scholar Francis Gladwin (1744/5-1812). The periodical, one of the first in India, would outlast the majority of its rivals, publishing for over two hundred years. These selections, extracted from issues released from the time of the paper's inception up to 1823 inclusive, predominantly compiled by Walter Scott Seton-Karr (1822-1910), encompass a vast swath of the history of Company rule in India. For these five decades, the Calcutta Gazette remained fiercely independent. However, by 1834 it had become the official publication of the Indian government and as a result was forced to comply with the limitations this brought.

A later companion volume, not present here, The days of John Company: selections from Calcutta Gazette, 1824-1832, was published in 1959.





A handsome set of Carlyle's modern history classic, with the distinction of having been presented to Prime Minister Anthony Eden (1897-1977) whilst a student at Eton. Eden entered Eton College in the Lent half of 1911. To the surprise of his father, for whom religion was a closed book, he won the Brinckman divinity prize, though his main enthusiasms were for languages and modern history.





The 'Cheap Repository' series of moral tales were begun in 1795 by **Hannah More (1745-1833)**, intended to be distributed as an antidote to the immoral popular literature circulated in ballad and chapbook form by street vendors and aimed to combat unscrupulous living and secular dissent.



A coherent *sammelband* of eight publications by Royal Navy officer Cowper Phipps Coles (1819-1870) on the contemporary state of England's naval defences and the construction and effectiveness of turret ships.

As a young man, Coles saw active service in the Crimean War, and distinguished himself at the siege of Sevastopol. Following his return to England he devoted himself to the study of defensive armour for ships and forts. His research ultimately led to the innovation of the revolving gun turret for shipboard mounting. The turret would transform the design of modern warships in the space of a decade, cementing Coles as a significant figure in the mid-nineteenth century naval technical revolution. In 1870, Coles perished aboard his prototype vessel HMS *Captain*, when, due to an error in construction, she capsized and sank taking the majority of her crew with her.

An article in the first issue of particular note provides account of the 1838 trial at Sydney, New South Wales, of several men indicted on charges of the 'horrible murder of aborigines in Australia'. The second issue is devoted almost in its entirety to witchcraft, in particular the Pendle Witches and the 'Borrowstowness Witches'.

Oxford holds parts 9-12, 15, 17, 24, 32. The first eight parts are not recorded by the usual databases.

An Ipswich-printed edition of an epistolary novel by writer and lexicographer Sir Herbert Croft (1751-1816), first published in 1780. This rather sensational volume went through seven editions, with many variations in the text, and deals with the clandestine love of a sometime army officer and Norfolk clergyman and the mistress of Lord Sandwich.

Three delightfully dramatic original drawings by Robert Cruikshank (1789-1856), likely commissioned by publisher popular literature and satirical prints Orlando Hodgson, who first published these images in his 'New Series' of theatrical prints whilst operating at 10 Cloth Fair, West Smithfield (which he left in 1835).





These images were surely commissioned by Hodgson to capitalise on the popularity of a work by British dramatist James Robinson Planche's (1796-1880), best remembered for his The Vampire, an adaptation of Charles Nodier's Le Vampire, itself based on Polidori's novella The Vampyre. The brigand, the published edition of which (London, 1829) featured a frontispiece engraving also by Robert Cruikshank, is, like the same authors Vampire - which also debuted in the same year, 1820 - another two act melodrama with Gothic influences. It had introduced the character of the perfectly poised Alessandro Masseroni as the titular bandit, presaging later incarnations of the Gentleman Thief. Indeed, as Planche notes in his autobiography, the role was so well portrayed by actor James Wallack, that audiences would 'scarcely receive him in Tragedy or Comedy'. Just reinforcing the commercial viability of the 1830's Hodgson productions, Planche also notes that several tableaux in his second stage success of 1820 were introduced from 'Eastlake's well known pictures...engravings of which had just been published...and were in all the printshop windows' (The Recollections and Reflections of I.R. Planché, London, 1872, pp. 152-3).

The second edition of Italian physician and anatomist Girolamo Fabrici d'Acquapendente's (1533-1619) book on the comparative anatomy of the skin, first published in 1618 as *De totius animalis integumentis opusculum*. In designing the first permanent theatre for public anatomical dissections, at Padua university where he had succeeded Fallopio as professor of surgery and anatomy, Fabrici revolutionized anatomic teaching, attracting William Harvey and Adriaan van den Spiegel as pupils. He was also a pioneer in the field of embryology.







Jaggard as 'By W. Shakespeare'.

Joan Orwin (d. 1599) entered the printing trade through her marriage to the printer John Kingston (fl. 1553-1584). Following his death, she subsequently wed their apprentice George Robinson (fl. 1585-87). When she was widowed once again, she married Thomas Orwin (fl. 1587-93), who acquired her stock and set up as a master printer. After his death she printed over sixty titles under the sobriquet the 'Widdow Orwin'.



The posthumously published first edition of an essay by poet and antiquary Richard Hole (bap. 1746, d. 1803), originally read before the Exeter literary society, on the mental excellence and moral virtue of Ulysses. The work, edited by his friend, physician and medical author, Bartholomew Parr (1750-1810), is the sole surviving fragment of a far larger project Hole was engaged in at the time of his death entitled Remarks on the Voyages of Ulysses as narrated in the Odyssey.

A rare account of a big-game hunting tour, on elephant-back, of Oudh and the Terai of Nepal by the Royal party of Alfred, Duke of Edinburgh and late of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha (1844-1900), Queen Victoria's second son, during his round the world voyage on HMS *Galatea*. The Duke was the first British Prince to set foot in India on his arrival in December 1869, and was met by various native rulers who vied to outdo each other with their entertainments. In the foot of the Himalaya range the de-facto ruler was Maharajah Sir Jung Bahadoor, who accompanied the Duke on his eight days shooting; the result was 'a total of 305 head in eight shooting days', including five tigers.

COPAC and OCLC locate copies at just two libraries worldwide (BL and Yale). Interestingly, a very similarly bound copy of this work (also in red morocco, with identical title lettering to the upper board, but with different tooling) was sold in the New York rooms in 2020. Given the limited institutional holdings, and the luxurious bindings, one wonders if this privately printed work was only produced for presentation.

The first edition of an anthology of nine oriental poems, translated into English by William Jones (1746-1794), including a translation from Sa'di's Bostan of the advice of King Nushirvan to his son Hormuz, and an ode by the fifteenth-century Turkish poet Mesihi, for which Jones supplies a verse translation, a transliteration in Roman letters, and a more precise prose translation. The two essays which Jones includes in this volume are highly significant in terms of the history of criticism, as they place the lyric at the centre of poetry. 'On the poetry of the Eastern nations' establishes Jones as a major precursor of the Romantics, demonstrating his desire to revive the pastoral and inject a basic reality into the genre which anticipates William Wordsworth's preface to Lyrical Ballads.







An apparently unrecorded, remarkably morbid register of prominent executions at Nottingham from the commencement of the thirteenth century up to 1860. The anonymous author provides succinct accounts of each crime for which the perpetrator was convicted, in most instances murder, but on occasion highway robbery or theft. One of the more protracted entries, and arguably the most remarkable, is that of Richard Wheatley, a native of Ilkeston, executed in 1774: 'In 1768 he was transported for breaking into a pie-shop...and was taken to Marylan, in America, and there sold as a slave, to the master of a coasting-vessel; but soon becoming an able sailor, he was impressed, along with others, to serve on board with Admiral Rodney's squadron, then on the West India station. He was subsequently put on board a merchant vessel, and in 1712 came back to England. He succeeded in getting into work at Loughborough; and in one of his excursions from thence, robbed the bleach-yard of Messrs. Unwin, for which, and being found at large in this country before the term of transportation had expired, he was condemned to death.'





The first Dublin edition, following the first London edition of 1778, of Marie Jeanne de Heurles Laboras de Mezières Riccoboni's (1713-1792) epistolary romance, Lettres de Milord Rivers, à Sir Charles Cardigan (1777), translated by poet and abolitionist Percival Stockdale (1736-1811), apparently whilst chaplain of HMS Resolution (an appointment granted to him by Lord Sandwich, then first lord of the Admiralty). The Critical Review (Vol. XLVI, 1778) were predominantly unimpressed by what they regarded to be a rather typical sentimental novel: 'The style...is lively and animated...but the story does not abound with interesting events, sufficient to excite the reader's curiosity, or to warm and interest his affections with energy and spirit'. The Monthly Review (Vol. LXI, 1778) were more forgiving: "These letters discover genius, and taste, of an order superior to those which are usually employed in novel-writing. - They unfold with delicacy...and are written with no inconsiderable degree of elegance and animation'. Riccoboni's work, her final published novel, and the only one where the primary letter writer and protagonist is male, was well received on the Continent. However, in his


translation Stockdale somewhat damages the intention of the original; rather than transcribing the proto-feminist themes (female friendship in particular), an essential feature of the novel, he not only contests them, but outright undermines the author's authority by inserting notes and an entirely new paragraph. He states in his prefatory remarks: 'I have made little Additions in some places, where I thought the Original was defective in Argument, in sentiment, or in imagery...I thought it necessary to correct some important Errours of the Lady, - where she was misled as a Philosopher; - where she was misled by the Partiality of a Native of France; - and by the Prejudices of a Woman'.

An interesting collection of publications from Ruhleben Internment Camp, near Berlin, which was established to house 4000-5000 mostly British civilians and merchant seamen, residing in Germany at the outbreak of the First World War. It was located at a racetrack in Spandau, a suburb of Berlin, and the detainees were mostly housed in stalls originally intended for racehorses. The camp remained operative until Armistice Day in 1918. The Germans, adhering to the Geneva Convention, allowed the detainees to run their own affairs, and when a printed press was introduced, the above journals were printed, giving an insight of how the 'campers' tried to re-create normal civilian life. The advertisements include tailors, shoemakers, hairdressers, bookshops, laundries etc., as well as sports results, reviews, and articles.

The German authorities allowed 11 numbers to be published during 1915, but only six numbers from March 1916 to June 1917 (and none after that date), owing to the scarcity of paper and other materials.








This is reinforced by William Jaggard (1868-1947) (Shakespeare hibliography, p.663) rather more prosaically: 'It would be a matter of some difficulty to find the part of Shakespeare this is supposed to resemble.'



There are many of them ting'd with an Air of melancholy, thro' the Loss of her only son, Lord Beauchamp.'

A bound collection of 11 transcribed letters between two authors and literary patronesses, Frances Seymour, Countess of Hertford (and later Duchess of Somerset, 1699-1754) and Henrietta Knight, Lady Luxborough (d.1756), and English poet and gardener William Shenstone (1714-1763). They were originally composed in the late 1740s when the latter was hoping that his friend Lady Luxborough would help to secure for him the patronage of the Duchess of Somerset; many refer to the poet by name, work or correspondence; others are directly addressed to or from Shenstone.

The main text of this manuscript, transcriptions of 10 letters over 37 pages, are in the hand of William Shenstone, who appears to have transcribed them for a posterity that his friend, the English dramatist and actor Thomas Hull (1728-1808), secured in their publication in the first volume of his collection of Select letters between the late Duchess of Somerset, Lady Luxborough, Miss Dolman, Mr. Whistler. Mr. R. Dodsley. William Shenstone, Esq. and others..., (London, 1778). It is, as internal evidence and the following detail explains, one of Shenstone's own manuscript volumes, referred to as ''Copies of the Duchess of SOMERSET's Letters, (transcribed by Mr. SHENSTONE\*)' in an anonymous (but identifiable as being from Shenstone's niece, Mary Wiggin) prefatory letter to Hull's printed collection.

The numbering of the letters contained within this manuscript is in the hand of Hull, and have in each case but one been corrected; thus the eleventh letter, not in Shenstone's hand, is loosely inserted and numbered as the first in the sequence; the first letter in Shenstone's hand was inscribed 'Letter 1:st' but corrected to 'Letter 2:d'. As what was initially the third of Shenstone's transcriptions is corrected to '5:th', one suspects another loose letter once present is now missing. Whilst this may appear bibliographical pedantry, it goes a long way to explain the likely significance of this volume to Hull's printed collection; the missing letter (Letter XXVII. Duchess of Somerset to Lady Luxborough, Percy-Lodge, June 17, 1749,) correctly sequenced, would have completed the set of letters between Somerset and Luxborough that were printed in 1778. It also partially (albeit not completely) explains what Hull refers to in his 'N:B:' All, except three ...are Mr: Shenstone's own Hand' to the foot of the title leaf, given all 10 of the integral transcriptions were clearly made by Shenstone, in his unmistakeable hand.


For corroboration of how this volume came into Hull's possession, via Shenstone's niece Mrs Mary Wiggin, we can point to Shenstone's annotated and interleaved copy of Allan Ramsay's *Gentle Shepherd*, Edinburgh 1755, later present in the library of Thomas Grenville and described in the catalogue of his library (London, 1842, Vol II, p. 593), which contains a similar note and was evidently


presented to on the same day as this volume: 'The Glossary and Notes on the Gentle Shepherd contained in this Book, were the ingenious Labour of my well-esteemed and beloved Friend William Shenstone Esq. They were given me by his Niece, and my respected Friend Mrs. Mary Wiggin, Dec, 1, 1775'. BL Additional mss 28,964, 'Some Remarks on ye Reading Milton's Paradise Lost' is a third example, with another note by Hull indicating that it was presented to him by Wiggin on 1 Dec. 1775. These two volumes, in addition to this newly rediscovered manuscript volume by Shenstone, are all mentioned in the preface to Hull's printed collection. Yet more proof of the provenance of this specific volume, were it needed, is provided by the footnote which follows from the asterix in 'transcribed by Mr. SHENSTONE\*' in the same preface: 'These particular Letters (I should presume) will unquestionably be allowed to deserve the Character which Mr. SHENSTONE has prefixed to them in his Transcript. It is as follows: Copies of Letters from her Grace the Duchess Dowager of SOMERSET (formerly Countess of Hertford) in which is discernible a perfect Rectitude of Heart, Delicacy of Sentiment, and a truly-classic Ease and Elegance of Style. There are many of them tinged with an Air of Melancholy, thro' the Loss of her only Son, Lord BEAUCHAMP.'

In addition to the volumes mentioned above, other manuscripts by and relating to Shenstone are held by BL, Birmingham Library, Bodley, Worcestershire Records Office, Wellesley and Yale.

Commercially, we could find few appearances of Shenstone manuscripts in the rooms in recent years. This is, thus, a rare opportunity to acquire a manuscript that demonstrates not only a revealing insight into the close connections between eighteenth-century poets and female patrons, but also into the process of printed literary memorialisation amongst eighteenth-century friends.



A remarkably rare survival – in the original if well-worn state - of a collection of popular amusing and entertaining songs performed at the London theatres in the first decade of the nineteenth century, including; 'Lady Fo-Nimble's Ghost, of Honey and Mustard', sung by Mr. Grimaldi, at the Aquatic Theatre, Sadler's Wells; and 'Will Cheerly. A Favourite Sea Ballad', performed by Mr. Gibbon, at Vauxhall Gardens.





The sole edition of a pamphlet by William Vanderstegen, published in vindication of his Observations on frauds practised in the collection of the salt duties, and the misconduct of officers fairly stated (Reading, 1793), in which he had levelled charges of corruption at the salt industry and trade. That publication prompted a brief pamphlet war, with merchant and member of the Thames Street Company of Salt Importers, Thomas Weston issuing a response refuting any allegations of misconduct. In this pamphlet, Vanderstegen politely, but firmly refuses to retract his statements, providing further evidence to bolster his charges, particularly with regard to profiteering from exorbitant duties.
