Attractively bound in contemporary gilt-tooled red morocco, contrasting black morocco lettering-piece, A.E.G. Lightly rubbed, remnants of silk ties to boards. Near contemporary inked ownership inscription to verso of front blank fly-leaf, very occasional light spotting.

A finely printed anthology of extracts from the works of Greek lyric poets Anacreon, Sappho, and Alcaeus. Publishers Foulis first issued a collection in Greek text devoted to these three authors in 1751, at least seven editions of varying lengths and formats appeared in subsequent years, the final edition apparently being that printed in 1792.



The 'transformations' are the only surviving work of **Antoninus Liberalis (fl. c.100-300)**, Ancient Greek grammarian, and consist of 41 mythical prose metamorphoses. This late eighteenth-century Leipzig edition is presented in the original Greek, with Latin and Greek notes (in two columns) from, *inter alia*, Xylander, von Berkel and Muncker.

Henry Joseph Thomas Drury (1778-1841), English bibliophile, Harrow schoolmaster and classical scholar. An early member of the Roxburghe club, Drury is better known as a master, friend and correspondent of Lord Byron. His significant library was sold (by Payne and Foss) in 1827; more than 4700 lots fetched almost £9000; this item featured separately in the sale as lot no. 106.



A finely bound manuscript, dated 1817, recording, in a legible hand, the procession, pageantry, and pronouncements of the court of assize in Northumberland presided over by High Sheriff Sir Thomas John Clavering (1771-1853). The manuscript commences with lists of the bailiffs and members of the juries, Grand, Crown, and Nisi Prius; there follows 12 pages providing details of prisoners and convicts to be tried, prior to concluding with a copy of an advertisement issued to papers throughout Newcastle inviting freeholders and members of the clergy to meet with the judges, details of dining arrangements at the Turk's Head Inn and instructions for the proper order of the procession from the inn to the hearing venue, and several further pages detailing events occurring throughout the assize week.

The crimes of those charged are predominantly concerned with theft of some manner, often petty, as with Ann Rutherford, aged 15, who was prosecuted on 'suspicion of having feloniously entered the Dwelling House Of William Younger...and having stolen taken and carried away therefrom a Muslin Cap, a Pair of





Cotton Gloves, a Frill, a blue Ribbon, a Thread Case, A Linen Shift and a Needle Case'. Another case was brought against Thomas Lowe, aged 34, on the charge of breaking and entering into the home of Charles John Clavering Esq.; suggesting Sir Thomas Clavering sat in judgement of someone accused of crimes committed against one of his relations. The exception to acts of thievery is Thomas King, aged 25, of Alnwick, 'charged upon the Coroners Inquest with having feloniously slayed Mary Scott, at the Parish of Ellingham'.

Paper title label to upper board. Generous margins. Trifling shelf-wear to extremities, else fine. From the library of Lord Eldon, with his signature and circular armorial book-label to verso of FFEP.

An apparently unrecorded prospectus issued by English author and legal reformer Basil Montagu (1770-1851) for what was to become the definitive nineteenth-century edition of the works of the Tudor/Stuart philosopher and politician Francis Bacon.

Perhaps best remembered today for his friendships with some of the leading romantics, including Coleridge, Lamb, Southey and Wordsworth, Montagu's edition was eventually published between 1825 and 1837 and extended to 16 volumes and is described by Mark Lester in ODNB as his 'own attempt at literary achievement'.

This prospectus is in itself a carefully constructed 'address' to prospective subscriber's, with extensive appended notes, commenting upon the inadequacies of earlier editions (such as that of 1753, where 'the Editor...without any authority, ventured to alter the whole of Lord Bacon's own arrangement of the third and fourth parts of the Instauration') and outlining Montagu's unimpeachably scholarly aims. The first volume of 1825 reprints an altered part, and by no means all, of this prospectus – as well as a somewhat derisory list of subscribers that, interestingly, does not include the owner of this fabulously bound volume, **John Scott, 1**st **Earl of Eldon (1751-1838)**, then Lord High Chancellor.

We could locate no institutional copies of this prospectus in either COPAC or OCLC.



Handsomely bound in later gilt-tooled red morocco, A.E.G. Very marking to extremities. Marbled endpapers, armorial bookplates to all FEPs of Sir Henry Cunliffe, very occasional light spotting.

An anthology of English ballads, preceded by informative commentaries commonly attributed to poet and playwright **Ambrose Philips (bap. 1674, d. 1749)**, including verse narratives on the myth of St George and the Dragon, the legend of Robin Hood, the folk tale of Sir Richard Whittington, and copious others informed by historical events from notorious murders, royal indiscretions, and London ruffians. Much as with his *Proposals for Printing an English Dictionary*, which foresaw many features of Johnson's Dictionary, Philips's innovatory collection impressively anticipated and informed the burgeoning popular interest in indigenous ballads.



The sole edition of British Army officer **Thomas Bell's (d.1782)** essay on the leading principles of military operations and the conduct of war, 'addressed to the young Gentlemen who chuse the military Life', and encompassing a broad aspect of subjects from campaigning to siege warfare, the cavalry charge, and the use of musket. *The Critical Review* (Vol. XXIX, 1770) approved of the work; 'This essay is wrote with energy and conciseness...we heartily recommend the perusal of it to all gentlemen and the military profession.'

ESTC records copies at just five locations in the British Isles (BL, Cambridge, King's College London, Oxford, and Royal Artillery Institution), and only three further in North America (Morristown National Historic Park, Newberry, and Princeton).

The first edition of George Benn's (1801-1882) authoritative history of Belfast. Begun in 1871, drawing upon the expertise of fellow Ulster antiquarians William Reeve and Classon Porter and the resources of Dublin Public Record Office employee William Hennessy, Benn's *History* was ultimately a commercial failure, a fact attributed by publisher Marcus Ward to the depressed state of Belfast trade. It did, however, meet with considerable critical acclaim; indeed Hennessy commented 'I think you have managed to do an almost impossible thing, namely to create a history for an unhistoric town.' A supplementary volume appeared in 1880 which carried the history to 1870.







Jane Bowdler (1743-1784), poet and essayist from a literary family, with her brother Thomas and sister Henrietta Maria editing the famously expurgated *Family Shakespeare* (London, 1807). This, her only work, was published posthumously and proved immensely popular, with 14 editions appearing throughout the eighteenth-century. The collection of verse includes 'Elegy on the death of Mr. Garrick', and essays including 'On Candour' and 'On the character of Curio'. The work is said to have captured the imagination of Queen Charlotte, who apparently read it three times.

An official account, printed and finely bound in Perth, of Queen Victoria's first royal visit to Scotland in 1842, undertaken five years after her accession to the throne, and two years her marriage to Albert. So taken were the Queen and Prince with the Highlands that they resolved to return, ultimately purchasing the estate of Balmoral in 1848 (though negotiations were not completed until 1852.)

The publisher and bookbinder James Dewar, in business from approximately 1820, was one of a number of binders present in Perth during the early eighteenth-century, likely fuelled by the proliferation of literary and debating societies in northern and central Scotland at that time. His bindery is not listed in Ramsden.






The first Elzevir edition of the collected writings of Flemish diplomat **Ogier Ghiselin de Busbecq (1522-1592)**, emissary to three generations of Austrian monarchs and ambassador under Ferdinand I to the Ottoman Empire in Constantinople. The collection includes Busbecq's *Legationis Turcicae epistolae quatuor* (1581), a travel journal in epistolary form comprised of correspondence to fellow Hungarian Diplomat, Nicholas Micault, providing detailed descriptions of life in the Ottoman court, and as such making the work one of the earliest specimens of travel literature. To this are appended 53 of his shorter ambassadorial letters.

EIGHTEENTH-CENTURY GLASGOW PRIZE BINDING






A finely printed Glasgow edition of the collected writings of Roman emperor Gaius Julius Caesar (100-44 BC), including his influential military works *De Bello Gallico* and *De Bello Civili*, and his often disputed accounts on the Alexandrine, African and Hispanic War, with the near contemporary additions of *Aulius Hirtius* and the notes of Samuel Clarke, much respected in classical circles and enduring from his edition of 1712 until the late eighteenth-century.

Although unable to firmly identify the binder, we have seen editions of classical works identically bound, and suspect they were commissioned by the Glasgow school for use as prizes - if not produced as a luxury edition binding for Chapman and Duncan. The recipient of this volume was presumably Robert Douglas Alston (1778-1846), son of the Lanarkshire merchant who travelled to and traded with pre-Revolutionary America, John Alston (1743-1818).

Outside of the UK, ESTC locates a single copy of this edition, at Harvard.

A *sammelband* of theatrical works by Spanish dramatist and poet **Leandro Fernandez de Moratin (1760-1828)**, published under his pseudonym, Inarco Celenio. The pre-eminent figure of eighteenth-century neoclassical Spanish Enlightenment theatre, Moratin further established his reputation through translations of Moliere and Shakespeare, ultimately securing the position of Royal Librarian under Joseph Bonaparte. However, his satirical commentary on forced marriage and the oppression of young women, *El si de las ninas* (included here) was denounced upon the reinstatement of the Inquisition under Ferdinand VII and the playwright was forced into exile for the remainder of his life.





Thomas Craufurd (d. 1662), historian and teacher at the university of Edinburgh. The majority of Craufurd's works were published posthumously, with this analysis of George Buchanan's (1506-1582) Rerum Scoticarum bistoria (Edinburgh, 1582) being no exception, printed as it was from a manuscript held by the Advocates' Library. The anonymous editor's introduction states that Craufurd likely intended his observations to be used for the further education of his students, correcting those errors made by Buchanan, elucidating the finer points of Scottish genealogy, and providing clarification for the more obscure Latin phrases employed.

The first edition of philosopher and theologian Ralph Cudworth's (1617-1688) pre-eminent work of English moral philosophy. A leading figure amongst the Cambridge Platonists, Cudworth was diametrically opposed to the doctrines of Thomas Hobbes (1588-1679) and devoted a considerable portion of his writings to refuting the polymath's philosophical arguments. The *Treatise* constitutes one of the foremost statements of innate-idea epistemology to appear in the seventeenth-century, positing, in contrast to the *a posteriori* morality championed by Hobbes, the fundamental ethical question of whether moral good is eternal and self-subsistent, operating independently of any individual; a notion first explored in Plato's *Euthyphro*. Printed from a manuscript belonging to the author's grandson, Franics Cudworth Masham, the work was edited for publication by historian Edward Chandler (1688?-1750) who provides an anti-Hobbesian preface suggesting that this treatise was written after the publication of Cudworth's magnum opus *The true intellectual system of the universe* (London, 1678), an assertion contrary to widely-held opinion that Cudworth began work on it during the 1660s, and that it informed his later writings.






Erasmus Darwin (1731-1802), English physician, natural philosopher and proto-evolutionary thinker. Conceived whilst cultivating his botanic garden at Lichfield, Darwin's lengthy didactic poem, The Loves of the Plants, first published anonymously in 1789, consists of dramatised representations of numerous species of flora, offering his first public speculation on the development of the natural world. Devised as two-part work, *The Loves of the Plants* was completed in 1791 with the appearance of *The* Botanic Garden, which contained a reprint of the aforementioned verse together with The Economy of Vegetation, a poem written in celebration of contemporary achievements in the fields of natural philosophy and industry and their leading proponents such as Josiah Wedgwood, Joseph Priestley, and Henry Cavendish. This nineteenthcentury printing of The Botanic Garden is bound with an edition of what is considered to be Darwin's most accomplished poetic work, The Temple of Nature. First published posthumously in 1803, the poem, a paean to evolution, traces the progression of life from primitive organic forms to the emergence of modern humans.

Ramsden lists no Huddersfield bookbinder with the name Brook; though it does note a James Brook of Ipswich.

A collection of pamphlets, lavishly bound for Royal presentation - somewhat ironically given the contents - relating the activities of the local Brighton branch of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge during the early nineteenth-century. The initial address highlights the branch rules, and includes a detailed 20pp 'catalogue of the books dispersed by the society', whilst the subsequent reports detail the committee's accounts and the activities of the parochial lending libraries as well as the distribution of various bibles, testaments, liturgies, psalters and religious tracts to 'Families in the District'.

All are rare. COPAC locates a single copy of the initial address (Durham), and just one annual report (1819, at Senate House; OCLC adds no further).





The first Elzevir edition of a compilation of miscellaneous epistolary political and historical extracts concerning Italian society, selected by **Girolamo Donzellini (c.1513-1587)**, Italian scholar and physician, whose conversion to Protestantism led to numerous heresy trials and his eventual condemnation and execution by the Venetian Inquisition.



First printed in 1695, Church of England clergyman **Theophilus Dorrington's (1654-1715)** A Familiar Guide addresses the issue of schism through a description of communion as a renewal of a covenant with God that cannot be observed properly outside of the established church. The work ran through eleven editions by 1724, with a translation into French appearing in 1699.

All editions are scarce, with this sixth edition being no exception; ESTC records copies at just two locations in North America (Massachusetts and Watkinson), and none elsewhere.

An unpublished manuscript account of the Flanders Campaign, the first major English land engagement during the French Revolutionary Wars, from the library of the commander of the British forces, King George III's second son, Prince Frederick, Duke of York and Albany (1763-1827). Known in only three copies (the other two located at the British War Office library and in the French Army archives), this work by Colonel Arnaudin forms an exhaustive history of the disastrous allied campaign against Revolutionary France which resulted in the fall of the Austrian Netherlands, the Dutch Republic and the loss of some twenty-thousand men under the Duke of York's command.

Exquisitely presented in the form of a significant printed work, with a dedication, introduction, chapters, sub-headings, indices and attractive diagrams of orders of battle, it was nevertheless clearly produced in the manuscript tradition. Regular numbered notes to the foot of gatherings of leaves (Tome Premier Campagne de 1793 – 1, 2, 3' etc) suggest that it was presented unbound; and occasional corrections have been made over neat deletion. This copy bears a lengthy dedication to the Duke from 'Letres huble et tres Obeissant serviteur H.E. d'Arnaudin', inscribed 'a Londres le 20 Janviet 1797'. Little is known of the author but from this, his own unpublished memoir of the campaign; however references in early histories, such as that of John James M'Gregor (Waterford, 1816-21) suggest he was a well-connected émigré Colonel attached to the

Austrian forces, and later part of the etat-major of the Duke of York.

Although bearing no evidence of provenance other than the arms stamped to the head of the spine, this was recently acquired by us with other volumes from the library of **Lt. General Sir Herbert Taylor (1775-1839)**, assistant secretary and aide-de-camp to the Duke of York between 1795 and 1798, and later Private Secretary to Kings George III, George IV and William IV. Taylor was one of the Duke's two executors, and the latter's will explicitly bequeathed to him 'all my letters and manuscripts (not being contracts, securities, or muniments of title); and I request him to preserve, destroy, and dispose of the same respectively, according to such directions as I may have given to him for that purpose.'







A rare survival, in fabulous condition and presented in fine red morocco, of what appears to be a privately produced volume listing the names, titles and the length of service of officials of the East India Company under the headings of 'Bengal', 'Fort St. George', 'Bombay', 'Fort Marlborough', 'St. Helena' and 'The Select Committee, Supra-Cargoes, and Writers in China'. Presumably intended for internal use, the printing of text on just one side of the leaf allows copious space for additions; in this copy no additions have been made, but the following corrections have been inserted: the '(suspended)' following 'James Taylor' of Fort St. George has been struck through and Robert Abercrombie's

promotion from 'Colonel' to 'Major General' has been similarly noted.

The lists of East India Company servants were of course recorded, in almanac form, in various publications. However, only two eighteenth-century editions of works dedicated to listing employees, as here without imprint, are recorded by ESTC, and both are rare: 1785 (Toronto only) and this edition of 1790 (BL, Oxford and Yale). Reinforcing the rarity of these lists, we can find just a single copy of each edition having sold in the rooms, since 1973.







An elaborately bound *sammelband* of 11 Stationers Company almanacs, for both ladies and gentlemen, issued for the year 1795; including a scarce calendar tailored for the use of Freemasons, containing 'Many useful and curious Particulars relating to Masonry', such as histories of the rise and progress of Masonry in England, Germany, and Holland, lists of current Grand Masters and Officers, addresses of lodges both British and foreign, and a record of the new regulations instituted in the eighteenth-century. The Company of Stationers' custom of binding annual collections of almanacs finely for presentation to court- and civil-servants endured from the seventeenth- to nineteenth-century; however, this example is even more elaborate than any we have previously handled, perhaps suggesting a private commission.

The sole edition of a study of the reign of Marcus Aurelius Mausaeus Valerius Carausius (d. 293) by Claude Genebrier. Carausius, a Menapian of Belgic Gaul, rose to prominence during Maximiam's campaign against the Bagaudae rebels of Northern Gaul, earning appointment to the command of the *Classis Britannica*, Rome's provincial naval fleet charged with the defence of the English Channel. However, Carausius was accused of permitting piracy and profiting from the spoils and sentenced to death. On learning of his sentence Carausius usurped power in the region, declaring himself Emperor of Great Britain and Northern Gaul, maintaining his power for seven years before being assassinated. In order to cement his claims to Imperial legitimacy, Carausius minted a plethora of coins in the interests of propaganda which Genebrier here discusses in great detail, with the benefit of accompanying plates, executed to a high standard.

The Society of Writers to Her Majesty's Signet is a private organisation of Scottish solicitors, dating back to 1594, and part of the College of Justice. The Society maintains the Category A listed Signet Library, part of the Parliament House complex in Edinburgh.

The latter is also reprinted here, alongside letters from Pitt providing further context for the dissolution of his ministry in 1801 owing to the King's insistence that Protestantism be constitutionally defended.

Two popular seventeenth-century aids to devotion, sumptuously presented in a stunning 'cottage roof' style binding with additional onlays. The first, The way to true happinesse, described on the title page as 'An entrance into Faith' and presented in the form of a catechism revealing the commonly understood Protestant meaning behind the Word as revealed in the Geneva Bible, was first published in 1602 as The doctrine of the Bible'. Popular in Stuart England, its appeal seems to have waned by the 1640s; the last known editions are this of 1642 and another, printed by James Young and undated, with a suggested date (From Wing of 1650). The second is a variant edition, with a strange jump in signatures (without loss of text), of the popular concordance, with verse references, first published in the same year. Long subject to speculation, the authorship of these significant and embarrassing political letters is now generally attributed to Sir Philip Francis, a clerk in the War Office - but Thomas Paine, Edmund Burke, Benjamin Franklin and Jean Louis de Lolme have all been identified as alternative candidates.

The final three dialogues (numbers 26-28) were written by social reformer and bluestocking Elizabeth Montagu (1718-1800), the last of which sees a 'modern bookseller' protest to Plutarch at being nearly ruined through being unable to sell copies of the biographers works: 'When I first set up shop, understanding but little of Business, I unadvisedly bought an Edition of your Lives...I sold a few to the Universities, and some to Eaton and Westminster...but unless a man has the luck to light on a Pedant he shall not sell a set of them for twenty years.' The Dialogues of the Dead were very well received, completing three editions within three months, after first sold out on the date of publication, 17th May.

It was unsurprisingly criticised in contemporary reviews as a thinly disguised attack on the policies of then East India Company Governor of Madras, Sir Thomas Munro.



Mr. Conway', presumably courtier and politician **Francis Seymour-Conway**, 1st **Marquess of Hertford** (1718-1794), Lord Lieutenant of Warwickshire at the time Edwards was vicar at Nuneaton.







Thomas Windsor's naval career included early service in North American waters, captaincy of HMS Fox at the Battle of Ushant, shortly after, an unsuccessful engagement with the French frigate Junon off the coast of Brest on September 10 1778, where he was wounded and the ship captured. After a short imprisonment in France, Windsor was paroled and returned to London to give evidence in support of Admiral Keppel.



The first edition of the only known work, published anonymously, of 'E. Warren'. Intriguingly *The Imperial Review* (1804, Vol. II) styled the author as Mr. Warren, whilst a reviewer in *The Eclectic Review* (Vol. III, Part I, 1807) noted that the author was 'evidently a woman of sense, feeling, and piety'.

Divided into four parts, each representing a portion of the day (Morning, Noon, Evening, and Midnight) in imitation of Thomson's Seasons, the titular blank verse poem is predominantly devoted to moral and religious reflection and imaginative excursions in a manner reminiscent of, and likely indebted to, Edward Young's *Night Thoughts*. Two further editions appeared in 1804.

COPAC records a single copy (BL), OCLC adds no further.

Webbe enjoyed the friendship of Lord Chief Justice **Sir Henry Hobart (c.1554-1625)**, to whom the book was dedicated.



Only 15 of these are directly attributable to Wotton; others are by, amongst others, Sir Walter Raleigh. In addition to featuring engraved portraits of Devereux, Villiers and Charles I, this collection is prized for a biography by Isaak Walton and a short poem on fishing.
