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





The first edition of British colonial civil servant Henry Jeffreys Bushby's (1820-1903) epistolary account of his experiences during the Crimean War, including lively and personal recollections of the siege of Sevastopol and the Battles of Balaclava and Inkerman from the oft-neglected perspective of a non-combatant. Two further editions appeared in the same year as the first.

The first edition of the first sermon given at St. Paul's Cross by Church of England clergyman **Thomas Adams (1583-1652)**. As with all his addresses, the structure of *The Gallants Burden* is atypical of the usual Puritan sermon model of exposition, doctrine, and application; being focused, in the manner of the medieval descriptio, upon revealing the four 'scorners' who threatened the commonweal: atheists, epicures, libertines and the 'common profane' clergy. Though esteemed for both his prose and oration by his contemporaries, Adams descended into literary obscurity until the nineteenth-century. The Poet Laureate Robert Southey described him as 'the prose Shakespeare of puritan theologians...scarcely inferior to Fuller in wit or to Taylor in fancy'. Two further printings of *The Gallants Burden* appeared by 1616.

Eric Gerald Stanley (1923-2018), scholar of Old English literature, Rawlinson and Bosworth Professor of Anglo-Saxon at the University of Oxford.

A posthumously published commentary by antiquary Thomas Gale (1635/6-1702) on the Antonine Itinerary of Britain. The *Antonini Iter Britanniarum*, a collection of survey documents assembled during the reign of Emperor Antoninus Pius (86-161), provides a map of the Roman roads that crossed the country, to which Gale adds information on Roman artefacts and antiquities discovered from the era. The work would see three further editions throughout the eighteenth century.


The supplement to Lincoln's Inn lawyer **Joseph Bateman's (1797-1863)** The General Turnpike Road Act (London, 1822), comprising the three amended acts issued under the reign of George IV with additional material on the correct maintenance and repair of roads. Turnpike roads were those highways on which tollgates were placed to charge road-users in order to defray maintenance expenses. The collection of these tolls was overseen by numerous 'turnpike trusts', each established by an individual act of parliament. Universally despised, and frequently corrupt, the turnpike system was eventually rendered obsolete by the rise of the railways.

A handsome copy of Scottish poet and philosopher **James Beattie's (1735-1803)** most influential poem, first published in two books in 1771 and 1774. Composed in Spenserian stanza, the poem describes the childhood of Edwin, a shepherd boy brought up in solitary mountainous country, and his imaginative response to nature. The work was greatly admired by William Wordsworth, who cited it as an inspiration.









The complete 10 number series of a short-lived eighteenth-century periodical edited by Librarian **Samuel Jebb (1683/4-1772)**, comprised of excerpts from the works of classical authors in the original Greek and Latin, transcriptions of classical monuments, original essays on classical writers and commentators, an essay on the English translation of the Bible, and extracts from Blondel's *History of the Roman calendar*.

Jebb began the periodical, intended to appear every two months, whilst employed as librarian to Jeremy Collier. Following Collier's death in 1726 he commenced studies in medicine, and - though eventually devoting himself to a career as a physician - continued to publish for a time, chiefly editions and translations, notably Roger Bacon's *Opus Maius* (1733).

A directory of British military service personnel, administrative staff, and civilian residents based in Egypt, Palestine, and the Sudan in 1937. The Anglo-Egyptian Sudan was a condominium of the United Kingdom and Egypt in the eastern Sudan region of northern Africa between 1899 and 1956. The geopolitical entity referred to as Mandatory Palestine was established in 1920 in accordance with the League of Nations mandate which assigned Britain with the responsibility of administrating the territory. The British occupation of Egypt had ended in 1936 (with the exception of the Suez Canal Zone), political and military influence in Palestine and Sudan would decline after the Second World War, with the regions gaining independence in 1948 and 1956 respectively.



The sole edition of pamphleteer and stockjobber Ralph Broome's (1742-1805) anonymous vehement verse defence of Warren Hastings (1732-1818) issued during the latter's lengthy court proceedings following his impeachment on charges, levelled by Edmund Burke (1729/30-1797), of alleged maladministration and unlawful execution during his tenure as Governor-General of Bengal.







A sixteenth-century printing of the only extant work of Roman medical writer Aulus Cornelius Celsus. Considered to be the only complete section of a larger projected encyclopaedia to survive, *De re medica* primarily deals with diet and the treatment of disease, drawing upon Hellenic traditions and Hippocratic practice, and is the first Western history on medicine. Written around 30 CE, the work was known in the Middle-Ages up to the ninth-century when it was lost. The manuscript was not re-discovered until 1443 at Milan. The *editio princeps* appeared at Florence in 1478, making it the first medical treatise to be printed.





Two popular works of moral instruction, including **Hester Chapone's** (1727-1801) remarkably successful discourse on the moral and spiritual conduct of young women. First printed in 1773, the work encourages the acquisition of a diverse education and promotes a degree of female independence uncommon in the era; and as such would attract the attention and praise of women's rights activist Mary Wollstonecraft. The unbounded popularity of the work saw 16 editions printed by 1800.

The sole edition, privately printed for Mrs. Wykeham Martin (who edited the work), of her son's correspondence sent during his participation in the hostilities of the Crimean War. British Army officer Fiennes Cornwallis (1831-1867) served with the 4th Light Dragoons, becoming aide-de-camp to Lord George Paget (1818-1880), having survived the infamous Charge of the Light Brigade.



The first edition of the entertaining and informative memoirs of Royal Navy officer Abraham Crawford and his service in the Mediterranean during the Peninsular War. Crawford was present at the destruction of the Turkish squadron off Point Pesquies, later serving under Admiral Carew in the blockade of Toulon and at the Siege of Tarragona (1811).



A crisp copy of the revised edition of naturalist **Charles Darwin's** (1809-1882) study of variation within plants and animals caused by the modification of species by breeders and horticulturists. First published in 1868, the work is notable for containing the first appearance of the term 'survival of the fittest (along with the fifth edition *Origin of Species* (1869)) as a substitute for Darwin's more anthropomorphic 'natural selection'; and the first expression of his theory of Pangenesis, the inheritance of acquired characteristics.





An early American edition, in original state, of the first work by Charles Dickens published in book form; a collection of short pieces concerning London scenes and characters, illustrated by the renowned comic artist George Cruikshank, which initially appeared in various newspapers and periodicals from 1833 to 1836.

A RESPONSE TO BIATHANATOS

A remarkably well preserved copy of the only published work, his popular sermons apart, of English clergyman **John Adams (1662–1720)**, provost of King's College, Cambridge and chaplain to King William and Queen Anne, dedicated to Henry Godolphin, provost of Eton College.

An extensive rejection of suicide on the grounds that universal acceptance of it would be 'destructive' to the order of civil society, Adams' Essay also explores the arguments of those who 'maintain this Act, to be Lawful'; namely the 'Stoicks' and most controversially, John Donne, of whose *Biantanatos* this work is the first serious critical study. The latter, which had not been reissued since the 1640s, was entered into the term catalogues and printed (without imprint, in octavo format, and for last time before the twentieth-century) soon after this work: presumably by an opportunistic bookseller aware of this study, and looking to satiate public demand for the original.

In this beautifully illustrated work, English antiquary **Francis Douce (1757-1834)** places the writings of Shakespeare within the context of Elizabethan and Jacobean social and cultural history. It was favourably reviewed, with the exception of *Edinburgh Review* commentator Jeffrey, who, provoked by an ongoing quarrel with bookseller Longman, produced an indignant critique, which resulted in a wounded Douce not publishing another work for 26 years.



Dedicated by special permission to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, this treatise by British military officer and colonial administrator **General Sir Howard Douglas (1776-1861)**, served as an artillery training manual for those entering the Royal Navy. In addition to providing detailed instruction on the structure, maintenance, and application of shipboard guns the work encompasses elements of military strategy, including the development of weapons and tactics for use in the bombardment of enemy ports - indeed during the Crimean War Douglas' ideas were applied at Sveaborg with cataclysmic results. The manual remained the basis of study in the field for some time, seeing five editions between 1820 and 1861.





This copy was once in the library of the late Jeremy Wilson (1944-2017), the authorised biographer of Lawrence.

From his notes of this time, copiously revised, he formed *The Mint* documenting his experiences as an aircraftman. Jonathan Cape published 2000 limited de-luxe copies and a trade issue of the same edition (1955), both heavily expurgated.











The seasoned Arctic explorer and his companions would recover the only documentary evidence of the expedition's demise, whilst additionally identifying the most viable possible route through the Canadian Archipelago - information employed by Amundsen in his successful navigation of the area nearly half a century later.







The first edition of zoologist St. George Jackson Mivart's (1827-1900) critique of Darwinism. Mivart's early enthusiasm for Darwinian evolution, fostered by the tutelage of T. H. Huxley, had waned by the close of the 1860s, primarily due to the restrictive doctrine of the Catholic Church to which he had converted. In 1869, in the liberal Catholic journal *The Month*, he published anonymously three articles entitled 'Difficulties of the theory of natural selection' in which he deconstructed Darwin's theory - the revision of these pieces formed the basis for the present work. Though accepting of evolution in general terms, Mivart contested the applicability of natural selection to the human intellect and the efficacy of the theory in explaining incipient stages of useful anatomical structures. This critique prompted a response from Darwin in an additional chapter headed 'Miscellaneous Objections' appended to the sixth edition of *On the Origin of Species* (1872).

Major-General John Money (1739/40-1817) began his military career in 1760 as part of the Norfolk militia. His promotion to captain in 1770 led to him serving under General John Burgoyne in Canada, before, in 1792, offering his sword to the French. In 1785 he would make two aerial voyages by balloon, just two years after the first ascent by Montgolfier. Money is chiefly remembered for his suggestions for the reform of the armed forces in *On a Partial Reorganization of the British Army* (1799). The theme continues in this work, with Money focusing on improvements to the arms, clothing, and organisation of volunteer corps. His address to the farmers of Norfolk seeks to persuade them to join the army reserves and make ready for potential invasion by Napoleon's forces; 'Have you practised with ball, and become good marksmen?...You say you will turn out when the enemy come - With what? Partridge shot! It is a great folly to suppose you can kill Frenchmen in this manner, as to send your children out to catch sparrows with salt.' The postscript to the work discusses the employment of pikemen in conjunction with musketeers and marksmen, particularly in those instances where rifle corps do not possess bayonets.

Rare, with COPAC locating only two copies of this first edition (BL and Senate House) and only two copies of the second edition (Oxford and Southampton). OCLC adds NLA only.

His third wife **Enriqueta Augustina Tennant (1843-1908)** established a library in her husband's name, investing into it £1 million pounds. The library was merged in 1972 with the library of the University of Manchester.





The first edition of James Hingston Tuckey's (1776-1816) comprehensive global geography for mariners. Whilst serving as a lieutenant in the Royal Navy, Tuckey's vessel was captured by French forces at Rochefort in 1804 - he would spend a decade in captivity, during which time he composed this magnum opus; stating in the preface that his imprisonment allowed him 'the perusal of many thousand volumes' for his research. The widely disseminated work owes a great debt to Matthew Flinders' Voyage to Terra Australis, which at the time of Maritime geography being sent to press had not been published. Tuckey provides immense detail on all locales mentioned, including the mapping of the coasts of Australia and Van Diemen's Land - with discussion of non-nautical details such as the flora and fauna of the region and a description of the habitation of the convicts held there, all informed by personal experience, Tuckey having been a part of a voyage undertaken in 1802 and documented in his An Account of a Voyage to Establish a Colony at Port Philip in Bass's Strait (London 1805).






