**A handsomely bound, early nineteenth-century edition of the collected verse of English poet and physician, Mark Akenside (1721-1770).** The collection includes two variants of the philosophical didactic poem *The Pleasures of Imagination*, considered to be the poet's finest composition, first published in 1744. The primary version is laid out 'as first published' in three books, whilst the second is on a 'an enlarged plan' and separates the final part into an unfinished 'Book the Third' and fragmentary 'Book the Fourth.' The volume also contains the *Epistle to Curio* (1744), a scathing satire of a political peer. The poems of Akenside exerted considerable influence on contemporary writers and subsequently the Romantics, through both his development of the genre of poetic inscription and innovations in the grouping of related material into single collections.

American Congregational clergyman David Austin's (1759-1831) *The downfal of Mystical Babylon* was first printed in New Jersey in 1794 as part of a compilation of **writings on the millennium**. An eschatological discourse, the work associates 'anti-Christian Papal Rome' with Babylon, the city that, according to Revelation, would be destroyed prior to the second coming of Christ. Austin proceeds to attack the alleged idolatry of the Roman Catholic Church. Intriguingly the author continues to insist that biblical prophecy anticipated the establishment of American democracy, framing the revolution as an analogy to the deliverance of the Israelites from Egypt.

Some of the pieces contained herein had appeared in the author's newspaper, *The Hull Advertiser*, under the pseudonym 'Alexis'.

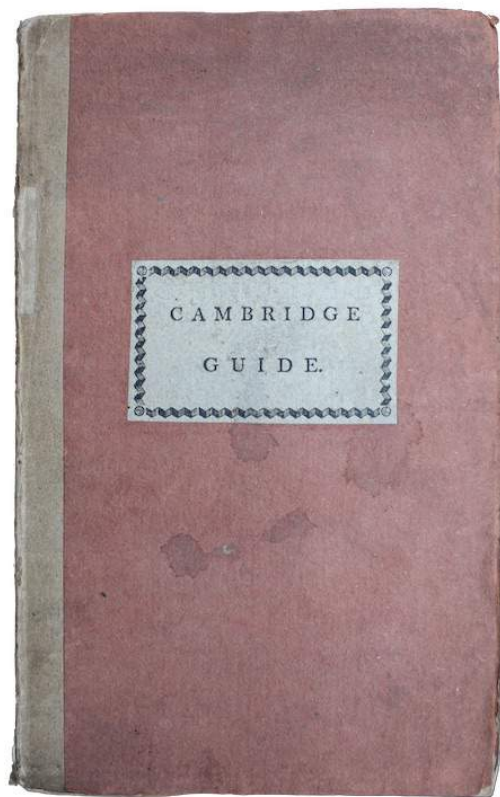

**A handsome, unsophisticated copy of an anonymous guidebook to the environs of the city of Cambridge, first printed in 1796 and updated, with the cancellation and replacement of the iv pages of 'Useful tables' of office holders, term dates and militia officers, for subsequent years.**

The guide is primarily devoted to the university - and was presumably marketed at newly arriving undergraduates as well as tourists - providing for each college; registers of academics and notable alumni, catalogues of the most remarkable artworks in possession, and descriptions of the libraries and their most significant holdings. Included at the end is a five-page account of the post coaches and stage wagons provided by various operators.

*J. SHEAD'S London Waggon*

Sets off from the Catherine Wheel, Bishopsgate-street, every Saturday, at 12 o'clock, arrives in Cambridge, on Monday in the afternoon, and returns the day following.

*OLIVER'S Waggon*

Set out from Manchester every Thursday, Friday and Saturday, by way of Sheffield; from Sheffield every Monday; arrive at the Red-Lion, Petty-Cury, Cambridge, every Friday, and return the same day, and carry goods to any part of the north, through Lincoln, Leicestershire, Derbyshire, and all parts adjacent.

Another waggon, by way of Wakefield, sets out from Manchester, every Saturday, and from the Windmill, Wakefield, every Monday; arrives at the Red-Lion, Petty-Cury, every Saturday, and goes forward to Norwich the same day; arrives at Norwich every Tuesday, and inns there at the Star in the Haymarket; returns to Cambridge every Thursday, and goes to the north, through Lincolnshire, and Nottingham.

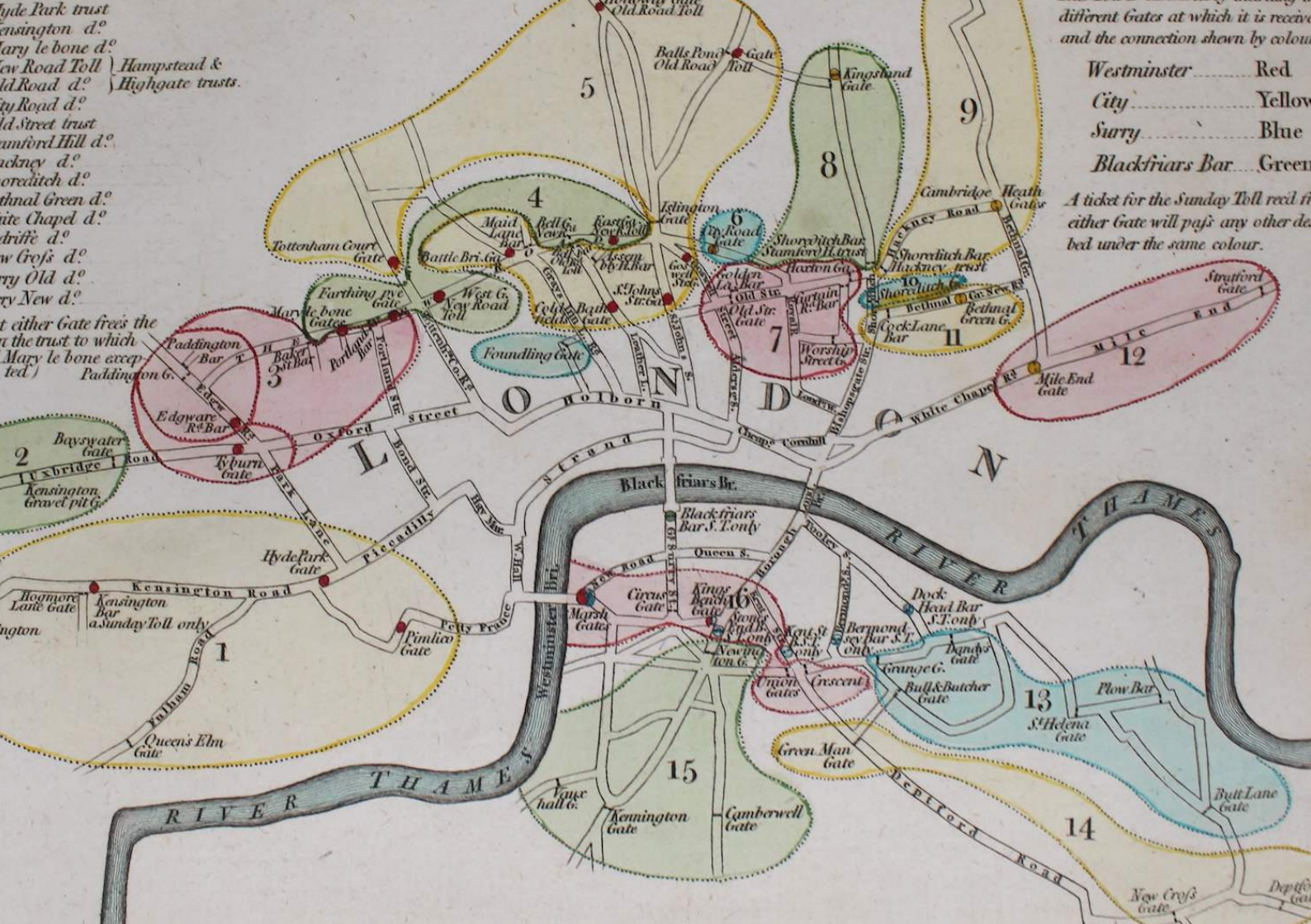

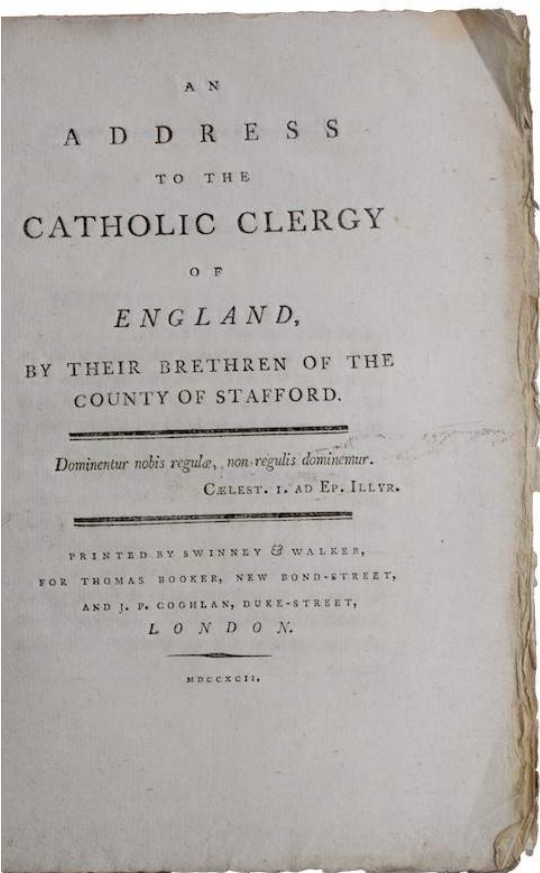
The first edition of cartographer John Cary's (1755-1835) atlas, executed to his typically high standards, showing the major routes out of London to Hampton Court, Bagshot, Oakingham, Binfield, Windsor, Maidenhead, High Wycombe, Amersham, Rickmansworth, Tring, St. Albans, Welwyn, Hertford, Ware, Bishops Stortford, Chipping Ongar, Chelmsford, Gravesend, Rochester, Maidstone, Tunbridge Wells, East Grinstead, Ryeigate, Dorking, Guildford, and Richmond. In addition the maps depict 'every Gentleman's seat, situate on, or seen from the Road...with the Name of the Possessor; to which is added the Number of Inns on each separate Route; also, the different Turnpike Gates, shewing the Connection which one trust has with another'. *The English Review* (Vol. XVII, 1791, p.386) said of the work: 'We consider it as an entertaining and useful companion to the numerous travellers who are constantly issuing from every quarter of this immense metropolis'. Further editions of Cary's *Survey* were published up to 1810.

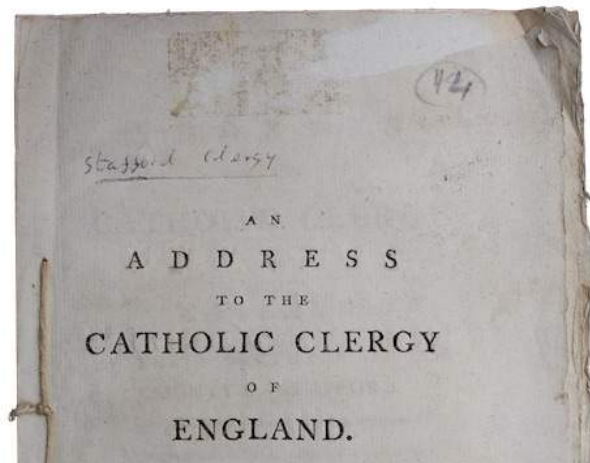

The first edition of Mancunian mathematician Henry Clarke's (bap. 1743, d. 1818) scathing squib on the farcical nature of elections occasioned by his unsuccessful candidacy for the salaried mastership of a school in the town of Stretford in 1788; a position that he coveted due to the lack of profit being made at his own educational institution, a 'commercial and mathematical' school in Salford. Established by Clarke in 1765, the school taught pure and applied mathematics and other sciences and, from 1772, pioneered evening classes for adults. Despite the poor returns, Clarke's methods were successful and he educated many good mathematicians, including Hugh Byrom and Thomas Molineux. *The Monthly Review* considered the 'learned wit...to obscure, both in subject and satire, for the generality of readers'.

This theme continued through later Letters, with Shebbeare accusing the whigs, in an increasingly scathing tone, of facilitating and supporting the continental wars of William III and George II in order to obtain increased political power, whilst further blaming the Newcastle administration for its poor European diplomacy and handling of the American war.

Highlights include:

**An apparently unrecorded Dublin-printed edition of an anonymous satirical verse critical of the treaty of Treaty of Aix-La-Chapelle.** The poem was issued by T. Fox of London in 1749 (copies of which are remarkably scarce), whilst this Dublin edition is dated 1748-9.

An anonymous account of the final days of Jacobite conspirator **Simon Fraser, eleventh Lord Lovat (1667/8-1747)**, who, in 1715 had supported the House of Hanover, but, in 1745 changed his allegiance to endorse the Stuart claim to the crown. He was among those defeated at the Battle of Culloden and subsequently held under charges of treason before being sentenced to death and beheaded.

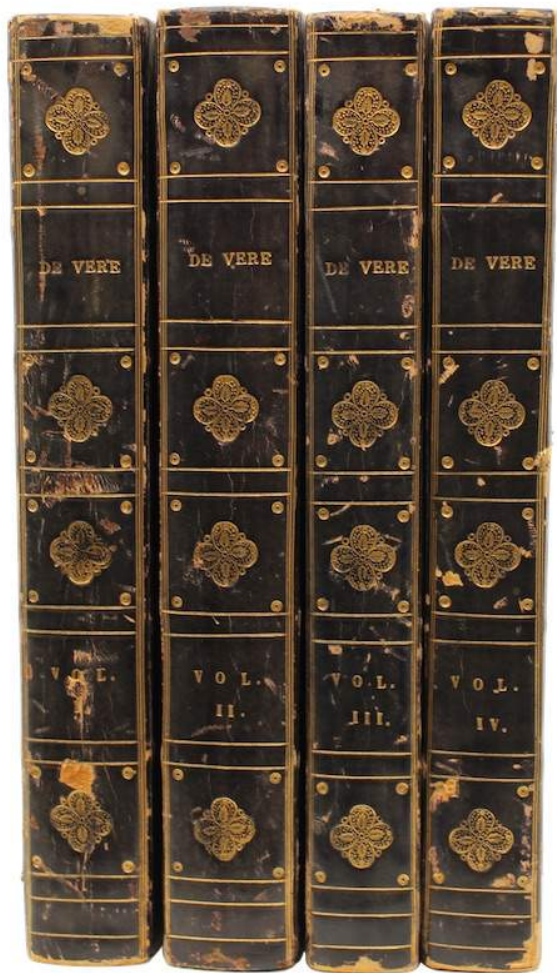

A pamphlet by politician John Perceval, Earl of Egmont (1711-1770) attacking the principles and conduct of Henry Pelham and Thomas Pelham-Holles, Duke of Newcastle (the two brothers), with regard to the War of the Austrian Succession. Perceval references the capture of the French fortress of Louisbourg by British forces in 1745 and is particularly critical of its restitution to France under the 1748 Treaty of Aix-La-Chapelle.

A rare survival of an Aesopian poem, *The horse and the monkey*, lampooning the controversy surrounding Irish physician Charles Lucas (1713-1771) during his campaign to secure a parliamentary seat in the 1749 Dublin by-election; in which he had angered authorities with the radical statement: 'It must now be confessed that there was no general rebellion in Ireland, since the first British invasion, that was not raised or fomented by the oppression, instigation, evil influence or connivance of the English'.
